Dear NPC Family,

Couple of things on my mind as I write to you today. First, I'm excited for NPC's 125th Anniversary Celebration this fall. I thought the new coffee mugs (and fancy coffee cart!) were outstanding, and I know there will be other reminders over the next several weeks of the century-plus legacy of ministry you share in. On Sunday, November 9th, we will culminate the festivities with special worship and a lunch gathering. On that Sunday we will also collect our 125th Anniversary financial pledges, which will include your commitment to the 2015 Operating Budget as well as the 125th Capital Fund (three year pledge.)

The 125th Anniversary Celebration also points us to the future. We rejoice in what God has done; we embrace by faith what God will do. As the writer of Hebrews puts it: "Therefore, since we are surrounded by so great a cloud of witnesses (those who have gone before)...let us run with perseverance the race that is set before us, looking to Jesus, the pioneer and perfecter of our faith." (Heb 12:1-2) I believe that God has great plans for you in the years ahead.

Which leads me to my second comment. I've shared with the elders and deacons that I believe that now is an appropriate time for me to conclude my interim ministry with you. After much thought and prayer, and in consultation with Presbytery, I've

identified Sunday, November 23 as my final day as your interim pastor.

I'm taking this step for several reasons. 1) It's my sense - no guarantees on this I realize - that your Pastor Nominating Committee is making good progress and may be zeroing in on their final candidate later this fall. 2) It is "Standard Operating Procedure" for there to be a kind of "interim interim" period of 4-6 weeks between the departure of the Interim Pastor and the arrival of the new pastor, and it seems that my November 23 date roughly fits this time-frame. 3) November 23 lets me complete my work with the last of the Interim Tasks that we identified last winter, namely, the financial piece of the 125th Celebration, as well as be a part of the 125th Celebration itself. 4) There are a couple of excellent "interim interim" folks I know of who will be available later this fall so the timing seems good on that front. And 5) there are several family-related reasons that make this timing attractive to me personally.

I know this news may strike some as a vivid reminder of the transitional nature of the season that NPC is in right now, and I certainly don't mean to cause any additional anxiety. I have great confidence that you are on the brink of a very exciting new season of ministry, and will navigate these final months of your interim period with grace and wisdom.


PASTOR NOMINATING COMMITTEE UPDATE

NORTHMINSTER HISTORY

From the Seattle Post Intelligencer:

In October 1956 the cornerstone of the new brick and stone sanctuary of Northminster Presbyterian was laid. First services were expected to be held early next year. "Participating in the cornerstone laying ceremony were the Rev. A. Taylor Dunlap, pastor, and J. B. Van Fassen, building committee chair.

Into a niche behind the cornerstone went a "time capsule," a copper box containing documents for posterity. Included were a variety of church papers and booklets, a shiny new 1956 penny, and a Post-Intelligencer account of the new church's ground breaking ceremony. The new building, a handsome edifice of stone and brick, also contains a basement dining hall and kitchen."
