Letter from the Pastor

Dear Northminster Family -

October welcomes us with World Wide Communion Sunday. This tradition began in Pittsburgh, PA in 1933. By 1940, the World Council of Churches had adopted the idea to be integrated across the globe. Just as the world was beginning to unravel once again with another World War, the church proclaimed that the table was a place of hope and a sign of unity. Now, 80 years later, the church still practices this tradition of World Wide Communion on the first Sunday of October. The table calls us to unity and to hope, and in the Presbyterian Church, we pair this with a special offering that is designated for peace making throughout the world. At Northminster, we will retain a portion of this offering for the work of Kathryn and Dan Smith Derksen as peacemakers in Cape Town, South Africa.

The first World Wide Communion Sunday was practiced as a proclamation of peace and this one that we practiced last Sunday in 2015 was still a firm proclamation of peace. The table, indeed, stretches wide into the world and enacts the peace that it proclaims. It is a feast indeed.

This is simply one more way that worship commits us to the world in which we live. Rather than calling us out of the world, or keeping us separate from the world, worship should invigorate and strengthen our presence in the world. We walk on sacred ground each Sunday precisely because our feet are firmly planted on earthly soil. The very fruits of the earth fill up the table as Jesus' reminder that the ground underneath us is the very place he intended to change. When we worship, we boldly dare to proclaim that God loves the world now more than ever.

It was counter cultural in 1933, and it is counter cultural now. But it is still our quiet and powerful invitation every Sunday.

In an effort to examine our Sunday practices more closely, our organist Eric Johnson and I will be teaching a class for three Sundays in October called: We Sing! The class will explore the themes that we see in worship every Sunday. We'll also sing together the hymns that guide us through our worship. Come join us to fill our Fellowship Hall with song and worship exploration on these October mornings: Oct 11,18, 25 from 9:00-9:45am.


