MISSION AND VISION

The Vision and Mission group, a combined committee of Elders and Deacons, has been hard at work for the last two months to review the Northminster Mission Statement, gather input from the congregation about current program and needs, and to write a report of the findings and recommendations. Members and friends of the congregation were invited to offer input through conversational meetings or written feedback to four questions regarding what brought each person to Northminster, why he/she continues to participate, what resources for spiritual growth are desired, and what service opportunities people would like to have. The responses to the questions were very helpful and guided the committee in preparing a summary re-

port and to come up with recommendations for next steps to be taken. The information will also be helpful when a new pastor search committee is formed. The report was presented at a joint meeting of the Elders and Deacons on April 22, and will be discussed further in another joint meeting of those groups. The report will also be available for review by the congregation in the near future.

NORTHWEST CHORALE CONCERT ON SATURDAY, MAY 10TH

The Northwest Chorale will be singing a free concert at Northminster again in May. On Saturday, May 10, at 7:30 PM, they will perform the Rutter Requiem and the Duruflé Requiem. These two pieces, quite different from each other, are both exceptionally beautiful and quite moving. Parts of both pieces have been sung in past worship services here.

Northminster was selected because of our great acoustics and our superb organ. Both pieces will feature organ as principal accompaniment, along with oboe, harp, and strings. Our Allen Digital organ, a gift from the Schumann family, offers exceptional subtlety in both voice and volume, which are necessary to present this music at its best. Our talented organist, Ahra Yoo, has been chosen to play the organ for these works.

Northwest Chorale is directed by Northminster's former choir director, Lynn Hall, and several of our choir members will be singing. The Chorale does not charge admission for their concerts, instead they take a free will offering at the intermission to benefit Northwest Harvest, which serves Seattle to feed the poor and hungry.

Put this date on your calendar and tell your friends to come. This is your chance to reach out into our community and help others as well as enjoy an evening of glorious music. If you can't come on May 10, the chorale will also be performing this concert on May 3, at 7:30, at Denny Park Lutheran Church, located at 766 John Street, near Dexter and Denny Avenues.
